



ABOUT MAYFLOWER 400

2020 marks the 400th anniversary of the historic voyage of the Mayflower ship from the UK to the 'New World' of America. The anniversary will commemorate the legacy of the passengers and crew who undertook the epic journey inspired by an unquenchable desire for freedom; and for who the voyage promised new found liberty. The international Mayflower Compact partnership has been created to align 11 core UK destinations across England, alongside the United States of America, the Native American community and the Netherlands. Partners are united in their passion to commemorate the anniversary and to celebrate shared values of freedom, democracy, humanity and the future.

Working together for the first time, the UK Compact partnership is creating a national 'Mayflower Trail' reflecting each destination's unique connection to the Mayflower story. In the build up to and during 2020 destinations will stage a world class cultural and events programme to commemorate the journey of the Mayflower Pilgrims.

The cultural programme will unite communities, inspire creativity, drive economic growth, enhance the visitor experience and promote understanding and education of this pivotal moment in history. The commemorations will recognise the impact of the Mayflower's journey on Native American communities and address themes of migration, tolerance, freedom and democracy that have such contemporary relevance, as well as the long-standing relationship between the UK and the US and the history of Thanksgiving, ensuring the Mayflower's legacy lives on.

There are over 35 million descendants of the passengers and crew who sailed on the Mayflower. The Mayflower 400 UK national visitor project aims to reach out to these descendants and other ancestral tourists to invite them to visit England and be a part of the anniversary year.

August 1620

The Separatists who remained in England board the Mayflower ship in **Southwark**, **London** including Captain Christopher Jones and his crew

15th August 1620

The Mayflower and Speedwell depart **Southampton**, planning to sail to Virginia

August 1620

The Speedwell continues to take on water so both ships turn back to **Plymouth**

19th November 1620

The Pilgrims sight the tip of Cape Cod

26th December 1620

After 66 days at sea, the Mayflower finally arrives in what is today, Plymouth, Massachusetts

What's the date?

In 1620 the Mayflower set sail from the New World. The official anniversary date used by the Mayflower 400 partners to mark the 400th anniversary is 16th September 2020.

Some celebrate the anniversary on the 6th September which was the date in the Julian calendar used by the Pilgrims. The Julian calendar is around 10 days behind the Gregorian calendar that we use today.

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THE MAYFLOWER TRAIL



Austerfield, Doncaster

Austerfield was the hometown of William Bradford, the second elected Governor of the Plymouth Colony in Massachusetts in 1621. Bradford was baptised at St Helena's church where the original font can be seen today. After travelling to America, Bradford was a signatory of the historic Mayflower Compact, and bequeathed much of our knowledge today on their momentous journey and early years of the Colony in his journal, 'Of Plimoth Plantation'.

Scrooby & Babworth, Nottinghamshire

The leading religious Separatists (who later became known as 'Pilgrims') were originally from the Bassetlaw area of Nottinghamshire, where their beliefs were shaped. The group were seen as dangerous religious outlaws and so they were forced to worship in secret. Among them was William Brewster who was brought up in Scrooby and later became senior elder and the leader of the colonists' community. Inspired by the radical words of Richard Clifton, the rector of nearby All Saints' Church in Babworth, Brewster is believed to have founded a Separatist Church in his family home, the privately owned Scrooby Manor House.



Gainsborough, Lincolnshire

Some of the Separatists are thought to have worshipped clandestinely at Gainsborough Old Hall with the permission of its owner, merchant William Hickman; they later escaped to Holland from the town's riverside. The Hall is regarded as one of the best-preserved medieval manor houses in Britain. Their preacher, John Smyth, was a strong influence on the Mayflower Pilgrims and is considered to have been a founder of the Baptist denomination. The John Robinson Memorial Church was built in the town to honour the memory of the local Separatist and Pilgrim leader in Holland, himself the founder of the Congregational denomination.

Boston, Lincolnshire

One night in the autumn of 1607, a determined group of men, women and children secretly met a boat on the edge of 'The Wash' at Scotia Creek, Fishtoft, near Boston. They planned to defy the authority of the English church and escape across the North Sea to Holland to live in religious freedom. The group were betrayed and stripped of their belongings and hope, they were brought by boat to Boston and held and tried at the Guildhall, home to the local law court and cells. Today, people can visit Boston Guildhall and see the cells where they were held. Nearby is the Pilgrim memorial marking the point at Scotia Creek from where they made their attempt to escape.



Immingham, Lincolnshire

The year following the trial of the Scrooby congregation at Boston Guildhall, they made another attempt to escape, this time successfully. The Separatists secured the services of a Dutch boat and its captain to take them to Holland. The Dutch captain set sail from Immingham Creek with only the men at first. The women and children who took refuge in St Andrew's Church, joined later. Immingham Creek is now part of the port of Immingham, the largest port by tonnage in the country.

St Andrew's Church welcomes visitors to re-discover the story and in 2019 will be celebrating its 800th year anniversary. On the nearby green is a memorial to those who made the journey, organised by the Anglo-American Society and made with rock from Plymouth, Massachusetts.

Worcestershire

Droitwich Spa, Worcestershire, was the birthplace of Edward Winslow, one of the senior leaders of the Mayflower and later Governor of the Plymouth colony.

The historic City of Worcester is home to the magnificent Cathedral where Winslow attended school before heading to London to do an apprenticeship. Worcester is often known as 'The Faithful City', being the last city to support King Charles II in the Battle of Worcester which was fought in 1651 against Oliver Cromwell during the English Civil War.




Leiden, Holland

Following their departure from Immingham, the Separatists landed in the free-thinking city of Leiden, known for its relative religious tolerance and a long tradition of offering shelter to the homeless.

They were allowed to practise their faith in freedom under Rev Robinson, who had a small group of tiny houses built behind the Pieterskerk (St Peter's Church) and offered services at his home. After living in Holland for nearly 12 years, they decided they would all travel together to America to start a new

They sold their personal belongings in order to buy a ship called the Speedwell and on 20th August 1620 they set sail for England to meet the Mayflower. Today, visitors to Leiden can find the Leiden American Pilgrim Museum, the Pieterskerk and see the streets and churches of the time the Pilgrims resided in Leiden.



The Pilgrims left Leiden and made their way to Delfshaven in Rotterdam. After spending a night at the port, they waved goodbye to the Netherlands and the Speedwell weighed anchor and headed out for the open sea, towards England. The Old Church or the Pilgrim Fathers Church can be found at the Voorhaven in Delfshaven.

Harwich, Essex

The story of the Mayflower is intrinsically linked with the historic port of Harwich and plays a special part in the iconic

The ship was originally designated as "of Harwich" and is believed to have been built in the Essex coastal town and was commanded and part-owned by Captain Christopher Jones, whose house stands on Kings Head Street today.


Jones was twice married in St. Nicholas Church, Harwich, and his first wife Sara Twitt lived opposite the ship's Captain in a house, which is now home to a popular local hostelry - the

Visit Jones historic house and experience the foundations of the Mavflower's journey in a town, which retains the same look and charm as it did in the 17th century. Marvel at a largely untold story of the Captain's life and see the Great Charter, which names Jones as a one of the capital burgesses by James I in 1604.





THE MAYFLOWER TRAIL



Southampton

The Mayflower arrived in Southampton in late July 1620 and several days later was joined by the Speedwell, carrying the Pilgrims from Leiden, Holland. Their intention was to prepare both vessels and sail together directly to America. The town had established trading links with Virginia and Newfoundland so there were many experienced seamen in Southampton who had previously made the Atlantic crossing. John Alden, a merchant, and William Brewster are thought to have boarded the Mayflower here, William after having been in hiding after publishing material that had angered King James. On 15th August 1620 the two ships weighed anchor and set sail.



Plymouth, Devon, England

The Mayflower and Speedwell were 300 miles clear of Land's End when the smaller ship once more began leaking badly and couldn't risk continuing. They turned back towards Plymouth and the Speedwell was finally declared unfit for the journey. Some of the Pilgrims decided against the voyage altogether and the remaining members crowded onto the Mayflower. The ship finally departed British soil on 16th September 1620 with up to 30 crew and 102 passengers on board. Just under half of them were Separatists, the rest were 'economic migrants' who were skilled tradespeople sent by the investors to help build the new colony. Today, visitors to the city of Plymouth can find the Mayflower Steps memorial in the city's Barbican area, which commemorates the passengers final departure point.



The London Borough of Southwark, which includes the former docklands of Rotherhithe was the home port of the Mayflower. Captain Christopher Jones and his crew lived here. The Separatists boarded the Mayflower in Rotherhithe close to the present-day Mayflower Inn and set sail for Southampton to the Speedwell. Today, people can visit the Mayflower pub (formerly The Spread Eagle) in Rotherhithe and view the original 1620 mooring point of the original Mayflower ship. Today, those who can prove a family connection to the original Pilgrims can also sign the Mayflower Descendants Book, which is available upon request. The Mayflower Pub is also the only pub licenced to sell US and UK postage stamps, a service, which dates back to the 1800s when seafarers docking at Rotherhithe with little time to spare were able to order a pint and a stamp!



Dartmouth, Devon

Having departed from Southampton, the Mayflower and Speedwell didn't get far before the Speedwell began to take on water again. They arrived in Dartmouth on 23rd August and, according to passengers, the Speedwell was leaking heavily and required urgent attention. The Pilgrims were regarded with suspicion by the locals, who feared they may be radicalised by these rebels, and the repairs were made in Bayards Cove Harbour while the Mayflower moored upstream on the River Dart beside what is now known as Pilgrim Hill.

While much has changed on the waterfront since, the Bayards Cove, Lower Street, Smith Street and Agincourt House, which is now a hotel, are still recognisable. It took around a week for the port's skilled craftsmen to rectify the damage before they headed out into the English Channel again, bound for the North Atlantic.




Plymouth, Massachusetts, US

After a perilous journey and 66 days at sea, the Mayflower finally landed in America. However due to bad weather, instead of arriving in the Colony of Virginia, where they had initially received permission to land, the Mayflower anchored much further south at what is present-day Provincetown. In search of clean water and fertile land, the pilgrims then decided to depart Provincetown and on 26th December 1620 they arrived in what they named Plymouth Bay, Massachusetts.

The Mayflower Compact was signed aboard the ship and was the first agreement for self-government to be created and enforced in America. The harsh New England winter claimed many lives and, by the end of the first winter, just under half of the crew and passengers had survived. The Pilgrims then began to form an alliance with the Native Americans of the local Wampanoag community who taught them how to hunt and grow their own food. At the end of the following summer, the Plymouth colonists celebrated their first successful harvest with a three-day festival of Thanksgiving, which became the annual holiday Americans celebrate today.

Heritage Lottery Fund helps tell the Pilgrim Roots story

More than 400 years after the Pilgrim Leaders, William Bradford and William Brewster, escaped religious persecution in Bassetlaw and began their arduous journey to the New World, the origins of their story will be retold, thanks to a National Lottery grant, awarded through the Heritage Lottery Fund.

HLF East Midlands approved the Pilgrim Roots project, which will see £776,000 worth of investment into the Roots area (North Nottinghamshire, South Yorkshire and West Lindsey). HLF have committed almost £450,000 to the total sum.

This will really enable North Nottinghamshire to shout about their famous Pilgrim ancestors and position Bassetlaw at the forefront of commemorative plans for 2020, which is the 400th anniversary of the Mayflower reaching America.

The Box Set to showcase Mayflower 400: Legend and Legacy

The Box; a multi-million pound attraction, gallery and museum complex and flagship capital project for Plymouth's Mayflower 400 commemorations will be showcasing the 'Mayflower 400: Legend and Legacy' exhibition as well as a range of artist-led and community engagement projects and a series of events on the run up to Mayflower 400.

'Mayflower 400: Legend and Legacy' is a Plymouth show and the national commemorative exhibition. Created in partnership with the Wampanoag Native American Advisory Committee, and with the help of over 100 museums, libraries and archives across the UK, US and The Netherlands, it will present an epic journey of survival and imagination.

Objects, images and ideas will explore early English attempts to colonise America, recognise conflict and coexistence with Native America, address the political and religious context for the sailing of the Mayflower in 1620, detail the lives of its passengers, and consider the cultural, demographic and personal legacies of the story.

Captain Christopher Jones's home set to become a tourist attraction

The former home of the captain of The Mayflower is to be opened as a tourist attraction in 2020. Captain Christopher Jones, from Harwich, led the voyage to the New World in 1620, which carried the Mayflower Pilgrims.

Tendring District Council (TDC) has now agreed a lease of his former house in King's Head Street, which will allow it to be opened to visitors in 2020 to mark the 400th anniversary of the Mayflower's historic voyage.

A significant part of the house has already been restored to expose its original features, and TDC will now carry out work to make it accessible to visitors.

The authority says it will also look at developing the house further with exhibits, while the Harwich Society will manage the attraction.

There is much interest in the USA and elsewhere in The Mayflower story, and already travel operators are marketing tours of Harwich and other relevant destinations for the year 2020 and beyond.

Government announces additional funding towards Mayflower 400 commemorations

The Government announced an additional £250,000 grant in support of the Mayflower 400 commemorations.

The funding will be used to promote and encourage American visitors to join the anniversary in England and to develop a 'digital Mayflower trail' which will bring to life the individual stories, heritage and culture of each location involved in the commemorations and is expected to launch in November 2019

Plymouth is leading a national partnership of 11 destinations within England, which are currently developing a year-long programme of cultural events and activities as part of the anniversary.

New dance and heritage project commemorating the Mayflower 400 anniversary is set to tour Mayflower destinations.

Multi award-winning choreographer Katie Green will bring her newest project 'Imagination Museum: Mayflower 400' to Plymouth, Lincolnshire, Nottinghamshire and Hampshire in the lead up to the 2020 anniversary of the sailing of the Mayflower. The project will see 5,500 people get involved in innovative dance and heritage events within their local communities.

From 2019-2020, the project will tour to 19 venues across the Midlands and South West of England, including museums, heritage sites, schools, community centres and churches.

Each performance will be different, drawing on workshops with the local community at each venue to develop the core dance piece and providing opportunities for community groups to perform alongside professional dancers.

Inaugural Mayflower 400 Business Networking Event Kićk Starts Extensive Programme of Commercial Transatlantic Opportunities

A Mayflower 400 Business Networking Event, supported by transatlantic law firm Womble Bond Dickinson and the City of London Corporation welcomed a host of key business leaders to Guildhall on the 18th of October, who gathered to discuss the commercial impact of the anniversary and the business opportunities that it presents for the City of London and beyond.

The Mayflower 400 commemoration programme in 2020 will comprise over 400 events that will span four Nations – Britain, US, Netherlands and the Native American Community and is anticipated to yield a significant £440m impact on the business turnover across the UK Mayflower Compact destinations. But business leaders are gathering to explore how business might further work with the anniversary for transatlantic opportunities.

Charles Hackett, CEO Mayflower 400 comments, "2020 is the 400th anniversary of the Mayflower voyage, one of the most influential journeys in global history and a defining moment in the shared history of Britain, the US and the Netherlands. The city of London and business is central to this history, so we are encouraging businesses to consider how they can work with the anniversary, the international connections that it highlights, and the programme of heritage and culture that is being created."

PLANS FOR 2020 – THE COMMEMORATION YEAR

As well as an ambitious new national heritage trail between the national partnership towns and cities with historic links to the Mayflower story. Here are some of the plans in place to commemorate the 400th anniversary:

Plymouth, Devon

The unveiled Plymouth projects for 2020 include:

- 'Mayflower Muster' week in September; incorporating a 4 nations civic ceremony and major military displays;
- new historic trails, taking visitors on a journey back to the 16th Century and exploring the city's wider heritage;
- renovations to the historic Elizabethan House, a "world class" Mayflower monument;
- · major theatrical events and public art commissions;
- · an 'Illuminate' community and art festival of light;
- the opening of 'The Box' the multi-million pound attraction, gallery and museum complex which will become the city's flagship cultural and heritage centre.
- the £48m Drake Circus leisure development will open in November 2019, bringing a new entertainment hub to city with top class restaurants and bars.

Scrooby & Babworth, Nottinghamshire

Exciting plans for a twelve month calendar of events are in place in Retford and the surrounding villages. Starting off with the signature Illuminate event in November 2019, confirmed activities include a national Conference on Religious Tolerance, a series of lectures across venues in Bassetlaw exploring different aspects of the Pilgrim roots history, a Pilgrim Walking Festival along the Chesterfield Canal and September 2020 Heritage Open Day will focus on the Separatist Story.

A new Pilgrim Roots gallery will open in Retford, enhanced interpretation will be installed at the Mayflower sites, new visitor tours and a new exhibition at Gainsborough Old Hall. Illuminate 2020 will bring the commemorations to a close with a sound and light finale event.

Worcestershire

In commemoration of the 400th anniversary of the Mayflower voyage, Worcester Cathedral will be hosting a Mayflower Conference in April 2020. The Cathedral will also be offering Mayflower 400 tour packages.

Southwark, London

As an internationally-recognised cultural destination, renowned for its vibrant performing and visual arts, history and heritage, Southwark Council is working with businesses, cultural and community partners to introduce a programme of events and activities building up to and through 2020.

This will include a specially written performance charting the history of the Mayflower journey, a talks programme and heritage trail taking in significant city landmarks and attractions. From Captain Christopher Jones Statue in St Mary's, which represents Jones looking back at England, while the child is looking towards the New World to world-famous Shakespeare's Globe, Borough Market, Tate Modern and The Shard alongside the heritage of Charles Dickens, John Harvard and the Mayflower.

Dartmouth, Devon

The volunteer led Mayflower 400 Dartmouth programme reflects the strong community spirit of the town. Among the highlights of the heritage, education, arts and culture, music and maritime programme are:

- a new touring play
- heritage trails
- · Son et Lumière at the Britannia Naval College
- · River Pageant with visiting warships and Tall Ships

Within the year round programme, the focal point for events in Dartmouth will be 31 August - 6 September.

Harwich, Essex

The Mayflower ship was originally designated as 'of Harwich' and is believed to have been built in the Essex coastal town. The ship was commanded and part owned by Christopher Jones, whose house will for the first time be open to visitors as a visitor attraction in 2020.

Visitors will enjoy an immersive experience of the town that retains its 17th century look and charm. In addition to visiting the Captains House, the Guildhall also is open for tours and to see the Great Charter (1604). A Mayflower themed events programme will be taking place in and around Harwich.

Immingham, Lincolnshire

The town is developing a programme of events to commemorate its role along with a new heritage trail and a revitalised Pilgrim exhibition in the museum.

Boston, Lincolnshire

Boston has been delivering progressively ambitious Illuminate events and lantern parades. It is planned to deliver even more ambitious events in both 2019 and 2020 and build on the vibrancy that has enthralled participants and audiences. Alongside these community and artist driven showcases an engaging calendar of events is planned throughout the year. Boston Guildhall showcases the cells where Brewster, Bradford and others were held while being tried.

Southampton

With a new Mayflower Trail the redevelopment of the Mayflower Memorial and medieval city walls Southampton will create a world-class heritage attraction alongside the existing Tudor House and Sea City Museum.

The cultural programme includes a Festival of Light in November 2019 and 2020 and both cultural and heritage events during the Mayflower Maritime Festival in August 2020, highlighting Southampton's long-standing history as a maritime city.

Leiden, Netherlands

Leiden has launched a new Pilgrim Walking Tour of the city taking in the Pilgrim sites. Premiering in Leiden, 'Intellectual Baggage' is a touring museum exhibition of an international collection of books that bring together five world views and a contemporary translation of these stories.

Erfgoed Leiden en Omstreken is creating an education programme for students from 8 - 11 years old on the theme of 'economic migration'. Another of their projects will work with Leiden University to digitally recreate lost heritage sites – including Rembrandt's House and the Lady's Church.

- The Mayflower 400 Trail: A connected heritage trail programme across the Mayflower 400 UK destinations with walking and digital elements and connected community outreach and education activities

- Wampum Belt Project: Native American communities
 traditionally recorded their history on special belts, many
 of which were destroyed or lost as a result of colonisation.
 Working with Wampanoag artists, this project will see the
 creation of a new belt, which will tour the UK before being
 gifted to the Wampanoag in a major civic ceremony

Mayflower 400 Destination Projects & Events

Festival

2020 will see a connected series of festivals across the country as each destination commemorates their role in the Mayflower's journey. Including:

- · Southampton's Mayflower Maritime Festival
- Dartmouth's Mayflower Festival, linking with their famous Regatta
- the Pilgrimage Festival, covering communities across the East Midlands and North-East
- Plymouth's Mayflower Muster will provide the culmination of festival programme, commemorating the departure of the Mayflower from the UK with an international four nations civic event.

Performances

 The development and presentation of major new productions, musical arrangements, compositions and street theatre led by multiple partners including De Veenfabriek & the Dutch National Theatre, Mayflower Theatre Southampton and Theatre Royal Plymouth (in collaboration with Seth Lakeman).

Public Art

 A series of exciting new public art commemorating the Mayflower's legacy, including work at the Mayflower Steps in Plymouth and in Dartmouth. These will augment existing installations, including Southampton's Mayflower Monument and the Pilgrim Fathers Memorial at Scotia Creek, Boston.

- The Harwich Mayflower Exhibition: a bespoke production based in the community, which will transform the town into a living Mayflower exhibition
